# ASWEET WALK IN THE WIEDS

## AT DUTCH HILL PRESERVES

A tour March 2023 meeting Laleña Stirr, who with her husband Mike Stirr co-owns Dutch Hill Preserves in Canadensis, gave a fascinating discussion and tour of maple sugaring — the process that turns maple sap into maple syrup.

"Mike and I started about 24 years ago, ordering buckets off of eBay," she said. "Our oldest son was an infant. I worked around his nap-time with a baby monitor on my hip, collecting sap." Back then, their "sugar house" was a canning vat over a wood fire in the yard.

Today, they have miles of tubing on their own property. They manage sugar bush on other lands in the area, and have a total of 3,000 taps on trees.

Because of the mild winter, 2023 has been a banner year for maple syrup.

"It's hard to compare year to year," Laleña says, "because sap production is a natural process that depends on the weather." Ideal sugar-making weather is sunny 40-degree days with a breeze from the west.

In an average year, they will produce 300 gallons for their Dutch Hill Preserves label.

"This year it will be 500 gallons, because we were able to get the taps in early. So we began making syrup in mid January. Instead of our usual 10-week season, we were collecting sap up until March 24."

Dutch Hill Preserves sells their maple syrup, fruit preserves, and toppings at local farm markets and online through their website www.dutchhillpreserves.com.

## How Many Ancestors Do

For example, because the population base was smaller, historically, there were marriages between second cousins, especially in small communities. This is the case in my own family tree — my great-grandparents were second cousins. That means that their grandparents were siblings.

Subjects for meetings were discussed. The founders realized that sharing stories of Paradise history at meetings was important... but also knew that information needed to be documented, recorded, and preserved.


