uly 4, 2026, will mark the 250th anniversary of the official statement of America's independence from Britain. 
#### Why they call it "Semiquincentennial"

# Immigrants Who Became



In the mid-1600s many Germans emigrated to what would become known as Pennsylvania—mainly seeking economic and especially religious freedom. Many found their way to the creeklands and woodlands that would become Paradise Township.

Ave you ever heard the surname Dornblaser? It was also spelled Dornblazer, Thornblaeser, and Thornblaser. What is this family's connection and contribution to Paradise Valley history?

The Thornblaeser family lived in Benningen, Germany and emigrated to the Lehigh Valley region of Pennsylvania sometime prior to the Revolutionary War, settling in Nazareth Township, Northampton County. This is evidenced by records in their name at Tohickon Union Reformed Church in Bucks County and Dryland Union Lutheran Church in Hecktown, Northampton County.


The emigrant was Christian Gottlieb Turnblaeser (b. 1726 Germany; d. 1783 Bethlehem, PA). His name can be seen on a tax bill for Bethlehem Township in 1781. His son John Paul Dornblaser (1760-1804) fought in the Revolutionary War. It is John Paul's son George Adam Dornblaser who is the subject of our story.

In 1810, at age 23, George married Maria Lavall in Easton, PA. He then served in the War of 1812 and eventually moved north into what is now Paradise Township about 1822, along with other families (Boorem, Nauman, Wagner) from the same church in Hecktown, the Dryland Union Lutheran Church. George settled on land near the current Keokee Chapel to raise his family and had seven children: Hannah, Daniel, Peter Paul, Joseph, Michael, John Nicholas and Elizabeth (who married Joseph Boorem).

George's children Peter Dornblaser and his sister Elizabeth Dornblaser Boorem stayed in Paradise Township, while other siblings either moved away or died young.

Why should the Dornblaser family be remembered? The family donated the land to build a church and cemetery for the local community. In 1851, Paradise Methodist Episcopal Church (now Keokee Chapel) applied for incorporation, and it was so decreed. A small church was built in 1852 at a cost of \$400. George was then 65 years old and Peter was 38. This one act of allegiance to their community continues to impact the history of Paradise Township — through a continued connection with the church and burial ground, as well as expanding its significance through the current community park and the "Roof".



George died in 1858 and was one of the first interments in the new cemetery. Peter followed him in 1903, the year after his 60<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary.

The PHS archives contain a Stroudsburg newspaper

article dated November 1902 highlighting this anniversary, along with a photograph showing Peter, age 88, standing in front of the church at an "Old Folks" service.

# Talking About Meetings...

On November 2, 2025, Peter Gonze will share his research in a talk called "The Story of Henryville." Our December 14 meeting is a members-only event, "Christmas at the Ace Store," hosted by Susan and Pat Newman, fifth-generation owners of this amazing piece of local history.

## The Semiquincentennial of America's Declaration of Independence

Our neighbors in Barrett Township (barretthistorical.org) have an extensive list of activities planned, including new displays at the Cresco Station Museum, a showing of the musical "1776" on March 20, 2026 and a talk by historian John L. Moore on the American Revolution in Pennsylvania on May 15, 2026. Both are free, and will take place at Barrett Paradise Friendly Library barrettlibrary.org.

#### Self-Evident Truths

Most every American knows that Thomas Jefferson wrote the Declaration of Independence. Most can recite from memory those truly revolutionary words: "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness."

But did you know what Jefferson's draft actually said? "We hold these truths to be sacred & undeniable; that all men are created equal & independant (sic), that from that equal creation they derive rights inherent & inalienable, among which are the preservation of life, & liberty, & the pursuit of happiness."

Jefferson's draft was revised and refined by a "committee of five," chosen by the Continental Congress on June 11, 1776. The committee consisted of Jefferson, John Adams, Benjamin Franklin, Roger Sherman, and Robert R. Livingston. Scholars believe that the ringing phrase "certain unalienable rights" was Franklin's. Even after the committee of five presented their document to the full Congress, further extensive changes were made before the members signed — putting their own lives, fortunes, and sacred honor on the line.
